# Defining the Gap – Trafficking in Human Beings and Data Policy

International legal instruments such as the Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings or the EU Directive on Combating Trafficking in Human Beings and Protecting its Victims contain defaults and requirements for States Parties to combat trafficking in human beings. These include the establishment of National Rapporteurs on Trafficking in Human Beings.

Data collection and analysis on trafficking in human beings and exploitation are essential in order to determine the extent of this human rights violation and to be able to develop political action plans as well as measures for the protection of trafficked persons and fighting crime. At the same time, data collection is accompanied by a variety of challenges and diverse interests.

Last year, the German government initiated the establishment of a National Rapporteur on Trafficking in Human Beings: The German Institute for Human Rights is developing a concept for the establishment of a reporting office. KOK has developed a data collection tool together with its member organisations. In October 2020, a first report was presented describing the concept from a civil society and human rights perspective and needs from the field. In October 2021, a first evaluation of data sets from this collection tool is to be presented.

At this conference, KOK would like to discuss the topic of data collection on trafficking in human beings and exploitation with experts, practitioners and politicians in light of current developments in Germany. Together we would like to shed light on the following questions: How are international defaults implemented in Germany and other European countries? What are best practices? What are the opportunities and challenges in collecting data on trafficking in human beings? Which developments emerge in Germany?
